INTRODUCTION

We love words and we love music and the marriage of the two results in song. And, if you weave the two together perfectly, you get art.


Meeting On Musical Terms

ONE DAMN THING AFTER ANOTHER LIFE MUST BE A REVUE

Where did the journey begin? If we were publicists we would compress our two histories and tell the story like this:

nya (the girl from Iowa) and Robert (the guy from Chicago) met fresh out of college while working in a bohemian-style nightspot in Minneapolis. Their musical collaboration began while performing the songs of Noel Coward (*Mad About The Boy*) and Cole Porter (*I Get A Kick Out Of You*). After doing a second musical revue together, *Nice Faces Of 1943*, they parted ways for a brief time: she went West and he went East. They reunited and their professional collaboration blossomed into a personal relationship when they took to the road and expanded their repertoire to include the songs of Kern, Berlin, Gershwin, Rodgers & Hart, Arlen, Waller, Ellington, Styne, Bernstein, and Sondheim. The pair's musical travels ignited a desire to write new songs together which led them to New York's theatre and cabaret scene. Their New York debut, an evening of revue songs spanning the years 1917 – 1987 and entitled *One Damn Thing After Another*, featured the team's first original song, *Life Must Be A Revue*.

In 1987 we decided to present an evening of revue songs called *One Damn Thing After Another*. But we needed an opening number that would catch the feeling of what was to follow and set up our theme. So we wrote our first song together: *Life Must Be A Revue*, which attempts to capture the ever-changing nature of a musical revue. The titles of earlier revues* are scattered throughout our lyric.
